



(VITA) program uses IRS-certified volunteers to prepare and e-file federal, state and school district tax returns for income-eligible citizens, at no cost to them. Most taxpayers with an Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) of \$53,000 or less are eligible. Photo ID and Social Security cards are required from all taxpayers, as well as W-2s and other tax documents. Both taxpayers must be present for a joint return.

Local History Corner

Newark's Lost Mansions by Cory Stutes



If you take a quick drive around Newark and the surrounding area, you'll be sure to notice a few large, historic homes on your way. The Swisher and Fleek mansions on Hudson Avenue, the Penney Mansion on Penney Avenue, Hull Place on West Main, or Rose Hill on Robbins Drive might catch your attention. However, those are just a few that have graced Newark's neighborhoods throughout the years. Although there are many grand mansions left to enjoy, several of Newark's finest homes are now just part of history.

Florence King, whose family home now houses the Heisey Museum, wrote a few wonderful articles in The Advocate in 1938 about homes that have become casualties of Father Time. One such estate was the residence of the Smythe family, located on the corner of 4th Street

and West Church Street. The home was built in the 1850s from stone quarried at Black Hand Gorge, and was supposedly inspired by Monticello. It featured massive columns along the front, and was a hub of socialite activity during its day. Florence King also told us of Spring Hill, built in the early 1860s by Hezekiah Sprague. The home was located at the intersection of Locust Street, Granville Road, and 5th Street. Many who visited the home loved it for its conservatory, which housed many fragrant and beautiful plants.

Another grand estate, the Birkey House, was built in the 1850s on a spacious property on the northwest corner of East Main and Buena Vista. Made of red brick, the home boasted the only third-floor ballroom in Newark. It was even rumored to be home to a genuine ghost! The park-like setting of the grounds made for an impressive spectacle. The home eventually fell into the hands of real estate developers who divided the property into small lots.

One of Newark's most unusual bygone homes was called Oakland Hall, which was the residence of well-known resident William Stanbery. The house was built in 1840 and was located east of Newark, across from the entrance to Camp O'Bannon on Butler Rd. Everyone knew of Oakland Hall during its heyday and many guests enjoyed indulgent parties there. It was rumored that there was a cistern filled with hard cider, and any guest visiting the estate would have been greeted by Mr. Stanbery himself seated in an easy chair on the front porch. The structure was comprised of five log cabins that were connected by a central hall, approximately 70 feet by 36 feet in size. The floor of the top story extended over the porch to act as its roof, and it was supported by four large tree trunks with their bark still intact. Oakland Hall burned down in the early part of the twentieth century.

Many of Newark's other prominent residences such as Myrtle Hall, John Swisher's mansion, and Gibson Atherton's "Castle," have all been lost to the forward march of time. Luckily, however, we are fortunate enough to have several of Newark's historic homes still left for us to enjoy!
